

Key Vocabulary

Phonemes are the smallest units of sounds.



Graphemes are the written representation of sounds.



Segmenting is breaking up words into the smallest units of sounds.

For example, we spell the word 'fish' by segmenting it into three sounds.



For example:


1. Break words into individual sounds.
